

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Camera Management Method


Tenda security cameras include ordinary cameras and PoE cameras. You can manage the camera through Network Video Recorder (NVR), web UI and the TDSEE app. Select the proper management method according to the actual situation.

1.1 Manage the Camera through NVR

1.1.1 Ordinary Camera

Connect devices. Step 1

You can refer to the following figure to connect devices.



Step 2 Manage the camera.

Enter the web UI of the NVR to manage the camera, and perform the related configurations according to the actual situation.

Refer to the user guide of the corresponding NVR model for details.

1.1.2 PoE Camera

The IT7-PRS is taken as an example here.




If the PoE camera supports DC power supply, you need to self-prepare a power adapter (port specification: 5.5*2.1 mm, power-related parameters can be found on the label attached to the device) that meets the requirements to power the camera.

Used with Ordinary NVR

Step 1 Connect devices.

Step 2 Manage the camera.

Enter the web UI of the NVR to manage the camera, and perform the related configurations according to the actual situation.



1.2 Manage the Camera through Web UI


- Step 1 Connect the computer to the Ethernet port of the camera, or to a switch or router that is connected to the camera.
- Step 2 Set the IP address of the computer to an unused one belonging to the same network segment as the IP address of the camera but different from the IP address of the camera. The following figure is for reference only.

The camera supports three IP address acquisition methods: **DHCP**, **Auto IP address** and **Fixed IP**. By default, the camera works in the **Auto IP address**.

If you search for a camera on the web UI or GUI of the NVR in the network, the IP address of the camera will be automatically synchronized to the same network segment as the IP address of the NVR, you can view the current IP address of the camera on the web UI or GUI of the NVR. If not, the camera keeps the default IP address (192.168.1.203).



After a camera is stably added to an NVR for 24 hours, the IP address acquisition method of the camera will be automatically changed to **Fixed IP**.




Step 3 Start a browser and enter the IP address of the camera in the address bar to access the login page. Enter the **User Name** (default: admin) and **Password** (default: admin123456), and then click **Login**.

1.3 Manage the Camera through TDSEE App


Step 1 Connect devices.

You can refer to the following figure to connect devices.



The smartphone has connected to the Wi-Fi of the router, and can access the internet.

TDSEE app has been installed on your smartphone.



Step 2 Manage the camera.

Run the TDSEE app. Enter the **Home** page, tap **Add a device** or in the upper right corner of the home page, then follow the instructions to operate.

Refer to the user guide of the TDSEE app for details.

Log in to Web UI

2.1 Login

The camera supports three IP address acquisition methods: DHCP, Auto IP address and Fixed IP. By default, the camera works in the **Auto IP address**.

This chapter mainly describes how to log in to the web UI of the camera when the IP address of the camera acquisition method is **Auto IP Address**. If not, refer to TCP/IP.



- After a camera is stably added to an NVR for 24 hours, the IP address acquisition method of the camera will be automatically changed to Fixed IP.
- If the PoE camera has been connected to the PoE port of the PoE NVR, the computer connected to the LAN side of the NVR cannot log in to the web UI of the camera. Because the PoE camera and the computer are not on the same LAN at this time.

2.1.1 With NVR in the Network


If the NVR is in the network, the IP address of the camera will be automatically synchronized to the same network segment as the IP address of the NVR.

- Connect the computer to the switch or router that is connected to the NVR. Step 1
- Log in to the web UI or GUI of the NVR to view the IP address of the camera. Assume that Step 2 the IP address obtained by the camera is 192.168.0.243.




If you cannot find the camera on the web UI or GUI of the NVR, try to search again.

Set the IP address of the computer to an unused one belonging to the same network Step 3 segment as the IP address of the camera but different from the IP address of the camera. The following figure is for reference only.




Step 4 Start a browser and enter the IP address of the camera in the address bar to access the IP address of the camera. The default is **192.168.1.203**. Enter the **User Name** (default: admin) and **Password** (default: admin123456), and click **Login**.




2.1.2 Without NVR in the Network

If the NVR is not in the network, the camera keeps the default IP address (192.168.1.203).

- Step 1 Connect the computer to the Ethernet port of the camera, or to the switch or router that is connected to the camera.
- Step 2 Set the IP address of the computer to an unused one belonging to the same network segment as the IP address of the camera but different from the IP address of the camera. The following figure is for reference only.




Step 3 Start a browser and enter the default IP address 192.168.1.203 of the camera in the address bar. Enter the **User Name** (default: admin) and **Password** (default: admin123456), then click **Login**.


2.2 Logout

After you log in to the web UI of the camera and click the **Logout** on the upper-right corner to exit the web UI.

2.3 Web UI

2.3.1 Layout

The web UI of the camera consists of two sections, including the navigation bar and the configuration area. See the following figure.





Features and parameters in gray indicate that they are not available or cannot be changed under the current configuration.

2.3.2 Frequently-used Elements

Click Log to enter the page.



Procedure:


- Step 1 Log in to the web UI, and click Log.
- **Step 2** Set **Major Type**, which is **Operation** in this example.
- Step 3 Select the **Start Time** and **End Time**, which are **00:00:00** to **23:59:59** on **November 09**, **2021**, in this example.
- Step 4 Click Search.



Step 5 Click **OK** on the pop-up window.



4.1 System

4.1.1 Device Info

Navigate to **Configuration > System > Device Information**.

You can view the basic information of the camera here, including device name, device UUID and firmware version.



Parameter description

Parameter	Description
Device Name	It specifies the name of the camera.
Device UUID	It specifies the UUID of the camera, which can be found on the bottom of the device.
Firmware Version	It specifies the version of the current system firmware.


4.1.2 Time Settings

Overview

Navigate to Configuration > System > Time Settings.

You can set the system time of the camera here. To ensure that the time-based functions of the camera take effect normally, the system time of the camera must be accurate. The camera supports two time-setting methods: NTP and Manual Time Sync. The default is NTP. After the camera is added successfully to the NVR, the time-setting method is automatically changed to Manual Time Sync and the system time of the NVR is synchronized.

- NTP: Sync the time of the NTP server according to the synchronization interval.
- Manual Time Sync.: Set the system time manually.



Parameter description

Parameter		Description
Time Zone		It specifies the standard time area in which the camera locates.
NTP	Server Address	It specifies the address and port of the time server. Network Time Protocol (NTP) is used to synchronize the time between the client and the network time server. After the NTP is enabled, the camera will synchronize the system time through this NTP server according to the Interval.
	Interval	It specifies the time interval at which the camera synchronizes the system time to the NTP server.
	Device Time	It specifies the current system time of the camera.
Manual Time Sync.	Set Time	It specifies you can set up the system time manually. You can set up the system time manually, and can also tick Sync. with computer time to sync the system time with the time of the terminal device currently logging in to the web UI of the camera.


Synchronize the System Time Through the Internet

After the camera is successfully connected to the internet, the system time will automatically synchronize with the NTP server according to the **Interval**. You can modify the NTP server and time synchronization according to the actual situation.

Refer to TCP/IP for the internet access methods of the camera.

Procedure:

- Step 1 Log in to the web UI, and navigate to Configuration > System > Time Settings.
- **Step 2** Select the time area in which the camera locates.
- Step 3 Set **Time Sync.**, which is **NTP** in this example.
- Step 4 Click Save.


After the setting completes, refresh the page, and you can view whether the **Device Time** on the page is accurate.

Manually Synchronize the System Time

Manually setting the system time of the camera is used when the camera is disconnected from the internet.

- **Step 1** Log in to the web UI, and navigate to **Configuration** > **System** > **Time Settings**.
- Step 2 Set Time Sync., which is Manual Time Sync. in this example.
- **Step 3** Set date and time. The following figure is for reference only.
- Step 4 Click Save.



4.1.3 System Maintenance

Reboot

If the camera occurs such phenomena as performance degradation, instability, and some abnormal parameters, you can reboot the camera.

- Step 1 Log in to the web UI and navigate to Configuration > System > Maintenance.
- Step 2 Click Reboot.



Step 3 Read the prompt message, and click **OK**.

Restore Settings

If the camera is running slowly or a configuration error occurs, you can try to restore the NVR.


- Restore the default settings: Except for the <u>TCP/IP</u> configuration, all other settings are restored to the factory settings.
- Restore factory settings: Restore all settings of the camera to the factory settings.

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- When the camera is restored to the settings, it will disconnect all current connections.
- To avoid damaging the camera, ensure that the camera is powered on properly during the process of restoring the factory settings.

Procedure:

- Step 1 Log in to the web UI, and navigate to Maintenance > System > System Maintenance.
- **Step 2** Find **Default** or **Factory** according to the actual situation, then click **Restore**.



Step 3 Read the prompt message, and click **OK**.



4.2 Network

4.2.1 TCP/IP

Navigate to **Configuration > Network > TCP/IP**.

You can view the LAN port parameters of the camera, and can also modify the LAN port parameter to connect the camera to the internet here.



Parameter description

Parameter	Description		
DUCE	It specifies whether to enable the function of the camera automatically obtain an IP address from an upstream device.		
DHCP	After the DHCP is enabled, the camera can automatically obtain its IP address, subnet mask, default gateway and DNS server from the DHCP server in the network.		
	It specifies whether to enable the function of the camera's IP address synchronization with the NVR.		
	After it is enabled, if you search the camera on the web UI or GUI of the NVR in the network, the IP address of the camera will be automatically synchronized to the same network segment as the IP address of the NVR.		
Auto IP Address	U NOTE		
Auto ir Audress	 If the IP address of the camera has never been synchronized and there is no NVR in the network, the camera keeps the default IP address (192.168.1.203). 		
	 If the IP address of the camera has been synchronized, and there is no NVR in the network, the IP address of the camera keeps the IP address when the last synchronization was successful. 		
	 After the camera is stably added to the NVR for 24 hours, the IP address acquisition method of the camera will be automatically changed to Fixed IP. 		

Parameter	Description	
Fixed IP	It specifies such information as the IP address of the camera can be set manually. After it is enabled, you can manually specify the IP address, subnet mask, default gateway, and DNS server of the camera.	
IPv4 Address	It specifies the IP address (also called the management IP address) of the camera. The user who is on the same LAN as the camera can log in to the web UI using this IP address.	
	To connect the camera to the internet, the IP address of the camera must be set in the same network segment of the LAN IP address of the router with internet connectivity.	
IPv4 Subnet Mask	It specifies the subnet mask of the camera.	
IPv4 Default Gateway	It specifies the default gateway of the camera. You can configure the default gateway of the camera to the LAN IP address of the router with internet connectivity.	
Mac Address	It specifies the LAN MAC address of the camera.	
Preferred DNS Server	They specify the primary or secondary DNS server address of the camera. If the router with internet connectivity has a DNS proxy function, the Preferred DN	
Alternate DNS Server	Server can be set to the IP address of the LAN port of the router with internet connectivity. Otherwise, enter the correct IP address of the DNS server. If there is only one DNS server IP address, please file in Preferred DNS Server .	

4.2.2 Port

Navigate to **Configuration > Network > Port**.

Ports number indicate different network services. For example, port 80 indicates web service. You can view or modify each service port number here.



Parameter description


Parameter	Description
HTTP Port	It specifies the port number for the HTTP. The default settings are recommended.
	Once the HTTP port is modified, when you log in to the web UI of the camera, you need to enter this port number behind the IP address of the camera. The access format is the http://IP address of the camera: HTTP port.
RTSP Port	It specifies the port number for the Real Time Streaming Protocol (RTSP). The default settings are recommended.
	RTSP is used to transmit and control the audio and video, and it is responsible for the request and response between the server and the client.
	URL format: rtsp://IP address of the camera: RTSP port/bitrate type.
	Q _{TIP}
	Profile0 means main stream and profile1 means sub-stream.
Service Port	It specifies the port number for the Open Network Video Interface Forum (ONVIF) protocol. The default settings are recommended.
	When the camera is added to the NVR through the ONVIF protocol, this port number is required.
	If the devices support this protocol, they can communicate with each other, which solves the compatibility problem of devices from different manufacturers (such as cameras, and NVR).

4.2.3 Email

Overview

Navigate to **Configuration > Network > Email**.

This camera supports email alarms. If you want to receive alarm notifications through email, you need to configure the email alarm function first.



Parameter description

Parameter		Description
	Sender	It specifies the sender's name. You can customize it as required.
Sender	Sender's Address	It specifies the email account of the sender.
	SMTP Server	It specifies the SMTP server address and supports the IP address and domain address.

Parameter		Description
	SMTP Port	It specifies the SMTP server port. NOTE After the encryption is enabled (SSL or TLS), the SMTP server port will be changed. The user needs to check and fill in the information by themselves.
	Enable SSL	It specifies the encryption mode for email transmission. Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) is a security protocol. It uses data encryption, identity verification and message integrity verification mechanisms to provide security guarantees for network data transmission
	Server Authentication	It specifies whether to enable the server authentication of email. After it is enabled, you need to enter the email account and password of the sender to log in to the email server. If this function is disabled, it indicates that users anonymously log in to the SMTP server. This function can be disabled only when the SMTP server address supports sending anonymous emails.
	User Name	It specifies the email account of the sender.
	Password	It specifies the password corresponding to the email account
	Confirm	of the sender.
Receiver	Receiver	It specifies the name of the receiver. You can customize it as required.
	Receiver's Address	It specifies the email address of the receiver.

Configure Email Alarm

Scenario: Assume that you have set up the monitoring network with the camera.

Requirement: After the camera detects a human, the alarm notification will be pushed through email to the specific receiver.

Solutions: Configure the **Human Alarm and Email** function to meet this requirement.

SMTP server address: smtp.gamil.com

SMTP service port: 465

Sender email address: Tom@gmail.com

Encryption mode: SSL


Receiver email address: Jerry@gmail.com




Please ensure that the NVR has connected to the internet successfully before configuring the email alarm.


- Step 1 Enable the SMTP service of the sender's email. **Gmail** is taken as an example here. (If it is enabled, skip this step.)
 - Open the browser, and log in to your Gmail. Click (Settings) in the upper-right corner, and then click See all settings.




2. Click Forwarding and POP/IMAP on the settings page. Find IMAP access, tick Enable IMAP, and click Save Changes at the bottom of the page.



- Step 2 Log in to the web UI of the camera to set alarm.
 - 1. Log in to the web UI.
 - 2. Enable the email alarm function.
 - (1) Navigate to Configuration > Alarm > Email.
 - (2) Set the name of the sender, which is **Tom** in this example. Enter the email address of the sender, which is **Tom@gmail.com** in this example.
 - (3) Enter the SMTP server address, which is **smpt.gmail.com** in this example. Enter the SMTP server port, which is **465** in this example.
 - (4) Tick Enable SSL.
 - (5) Tick Authentication.
 - (6) Enter the **User Name** in **Sender Email Account**, which is **Tom@gmail.com** in this example. Enter the **Password** of the Gmail of the sender and confirm the password.
 - (7) Set the name of the receiver, which is **Jerry** in this example. Enter the email address of the receiver, which is **Jerry@gmail.com** in this example.
 - (8) Click Save.



- 3. Set the human alarm.
 - (1) Navigate to Configuration > Basic Event > Motion Detection.
 - (2) Set Alarm Mode, which is Human Alarm in this example.
 - (3) Tick Send Email.
 - (4) Click Save.





After the setting completes, if the camera detects a human, the alarm notification will be pushed to the receiver through email.

4.3 Video/Audio

Navigate to Configuration > Video/Audio > Video.

The audio and video function enables you to adjust the video code parameters.



Parameter description

Parameter	Description		
	It specifies the stream type of the camera.		
Stream Type	 Main Stream: The stream has a large value and a high occupied bandwidth, which is applicable for large-screen monitoring and storage. 		
	 Sub Stream: The stream has a small value and a small occupied bandwidth, which is applicable for small-screen monitoring and network transmission. 		
Video Type	It specifies the multi-media type. Only the video code parameters can be adjusted.		
Resolution	It specifies the number of pixels contained in a frame of an image. The higher the resolution, the clearer the image and the more obvious details.		
	It specifies the bit rate control method of the video.		
Bitrate Type	 Fixed: The fixed bit rate tries to encode according to the upper limit of the bit rate, and the bit rate will fluctuate up and down in the bit rate value, and will not change with the monitoring scene. 		
	 Variable: The bit rate will change with the monitoring scene. Adopt a high bit rate when the monitoring scene is moving or changing. The variable bit rate adopts a lower bit rate when the monitoring scene is static. 		
Video Quality	It specifies the quality level of the video. Please set it according to the actual situation. This parameter is available only when Bitrate Type is set to Variable .		

Parameter	Description	
Frame Rate	It specifies the number of video frames displayed per second. The higher the frame rate, the smoother the image.	
Max. Bitrate	It specifies the size of the video data per unit time. The larger the bit rate, the better the picture quality.	
Video Encoding	 It specifies the encoding standard of the NVR. H.264: A generation of highly compressed video codec standards after MPEG4, which improves compression efficiency under the same video quality. H.265: A generation of video coding standards after H.264, which improves the bit stream, coding quality, and delay to optimize coding and save more bandwidth and capacity under the same video quality. 	
I Frame Interval	It specifies the number of the ordinary frame between two I frames (keyframe).	


4.4 Image

4.4.1 Display Settings

Overview

Navigate to **Configuration > Image > Displays Settings**.

The display settings function enables you to set the day and night switching mode of the camera, and can also adjust the image parameters to improve the visual effect of the camera monitoring image.



Parameter description

Parameter		Description
Switch Day and Night Settings	Auto Mode	It specifies the camera switches to day mode or night mode according to the environment's brightness.
	Scheduled Mode	It specifies the camera switches to the corresponding mode according to the Day Start Time and Night Start Time you preset.
	Day Mode	It specifies the camera monitoring mode always is in day mode, and the monitoring image always is colorful.
	Night Mode	It specifies the camera monitoring mode always is night mode. After the infrared fill light of the camera is enabled, the monitoring image always is black and white.

Parameter		Description
Light Mode	Night Version Mode	It specifies the monitoring image effect of the camera at night. It is applicable for the full-color version of the camera.
		 Smart Night Vision: When the camera detects a moving object or a human figure, the white light fill light of the camera is enabled, and the monitoring image is in color; otherwise, the infrared fill light is enabled, and the monitoring image is black and white.
		 Full Color Night Vision: The white light fill light of the camera is enabled, and the monitoring image is always in color.
		 Black & White Night Vision: The camera infrared fill light is enabled, and the monitoring image is always black and white.
		It specifies the brightness of the image.
	Brightness	The brightness value can be adjusted when the overall monitoring image is dark or bright. The larger the value, the brighter the image.
		It specifies the ratio of the lightest area to the darkest area in the image.
Image Adjustment	Contrast	The contrast value can be adjusted when the sense of layering in the monitoring image is poor, and the contrast between the white and black color of the image is insufficient. The larger the value, the greater the contrast between light and dark of the image, and the clearer the image.
	Saturation	It specifies the vividness of the colors in the image. The larger the value, the more vivid the image color.
	Sharpness	It specifies the sharpness of the edges of the image. The larger the value, the more obvious the edges of the image.
		It specifies the exposure mode of the camera.
		 Auto: Adjust the exposure time of the sensitization device (such as CCD) according to the strength of the light.
Exposure Settings	Iris Mode	 Auto Gain: Automatically adjust the gain according to the manually adjusted exposure time to enable the camera to output standard images under different lighting conditions.
		 Auto Shutter: Automatically adjust the exposure time according to the manually adjusted gain to enable the camera to output standard images under different lighting conditions.
		 Manual: Manually adjust the exposure time and gain.
		It specifies the electronic shutter time of the camera.
	Exposure Time	If the scene brightness, iris and gain are unchanged, the longer the exposure time, the higher the screen brightness.


Parameter		Description
	Gain	It specifies the sensitivity of the camera. It is used to amplify the image signal after exposure.
		If the scene brightness, aperture, and exposure time are unchanged, the greater the gain, the higher the screen brightness.
Video Adjustment	Mirror	It specifies the monitoring image performs left and right exchange after the mirror is enabled.
	Rotate	It specifies the monitoring image can be rotated. Please set it according to the actual situation.






4.4.3 Privacy Mask

You can set some areas in the monitoring image (such as the ATM password button area) as privacy areas here. After it is set as the privacy area, the area will not be displayed on the monitoring image to ensure the privacy of the area.

Use the mouse to draw a privacy area in the preview area on the left. The relevant parameters will be automatically filled in the right input box. You can modify or delete the privacy area as required.


